This report highlights the well-being of children living in the 50-largest cities in the United States. The profiles in this report compare the well-being of children across cities, states, and a 50-city average for five key indicators of child well-being:

- Children living in poverty;
- Children living in single-parent families;
- Teens ages 16 to 19 who are high school dropouts;
- Children ages 5 to 17 with difficulty speaking English; and
- Children with no parents in the labor force.

Although these five measures are not intended to capture the full range of conditions shaping children's lives, we believe that these indicators reflect many of the key factors indicative of or affecting child welfare. Moreover, the measures are consistent across geographic areas. Definitions for each of the measures are included in the Appendix in the back of this report.

All of the estimates in this report are based on published tables from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS). The ACS is a nationwide annual survey designed to provide communities with reliable and timely demographic, housing, social, and economic data each year. The 2000 to 2004 ACS surveys provide information for states and geographic areas with 250,000 or more people. Beginning in 2006, ACS data will be available for areas with populations of 65,000 or more. By 2009, pending continued Congressional funding, the ACS will have sampled 15 million addresses and by 2010, the Census Bureau will provide five-year averages of demographic, housing, social, and economic data from the ACS for the nation, states, cities, counties, and even smaller geographic areas. These five-year averages will then be updated annually and will provide, for the first time, the ability to monitor social and economic trends in local communities in years between decennial censuses.

The data in this report were prepared by the Population Reference Bureau for The Annie E. Casey Foundation's KIDS COUNT Network. 

Appendix: Variable Definitions

The estimates presented in these profiles were assembled by staff at the Population Reference Bureau using data from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS). The 2004 ACS excluded the population residing in group quarters.

Children living in poverty

Children under age 18 residing in a family with income below the U.S. poverty threshold. Does not include children living in group quarters and unrelated individuals under 15 years old. The average poverty threshold for a family of four was \$19,307 in 2004.

Children living in single-parent families

Own children under age 18 living in families or subfamilies headed by a single parent—male or female—without a spouse present in the home.

Teen who are high school dropouts

Teens ages 16 to 19 who are not enrolled in school (full- or part-time) and are not high school graduates. Those who have a GED or equivalent are included as high school graduates in this measure.

Children who have difficulty speaking English

Children ages 5 to 17 who speak a language other than English at home and speak English less than "very well."

Children with no parents in the labor force

Own children under age 18 living in families or subfamilies where no parent is in the labor force.

50-City Average

The 50-city average is based on data for the 50-largest cities in the United States.
